


Minnie Mönighoff about 1869, Newark, NJ.

Minnie Mönighoff

1867-1928

Born 6 January 1867 in Newark, NJ, Maria Wilhelmina Augustina Mönighoff was the eighth and youngest child of Elisabeth Robrecht and William Mönighoff.

Minnie's German Catholic parents immigrated to the U.S. from neighboring villages in north-central Germany. Minnie's father came to the U.S. in 1839 when he was 19 years old, and was the youngest of 11 children. Minnie's mother, who was the youngest of seven children, immigrated in 1848 at age 25.

Minnie's father worked as a retail and wholesale grocer to support his large family, and his grocery business was listed in the Newark City Directory for 41 years, from 1851 to 1892.

The Mönighoff family lived in the large "Germantown" community of Newark, NJ, where thousands of German immigrants perpetuated their old-country culture and language. In January 1867 baby Minnie was baptized in St. Peter's German Catholic Church in Newark, NJ.

The Schwartz Family History

At Minnie's birth, her sisters were ages 16 and 12; her brothers were ages 17, 8, and 3. Sisters Marianna and Marie both died before Minnie's birth.

When Minnie was two years old, her oldest sister, Elisabeth, married and three days later Minnie's nine year-old brother, Henry, died.

Minnie's mother died in February 1873 when Minnie was six years old. After their mother's death, Minnie's 17 year-old sister, Theresia, took over housekeeping and childcare until May 1877 when Minnie's father remarried. Minnie was 10 years old and Charles was 13 when their German stepmother and three stepsisters (ages 7, 11, and 17) came to live in the Mönighoff home on Academy Street.

When their father remarried, the two oldest Mönighoff children no longer lived at home: sister Elisabeth lived across the street with her husband and their children, and brother Joseph worked in a saloon.

In 1882 when Minnie was 15 years old, her 31 year-old sister, Elisabeth, died, leaving a husband and seven children.

Minnie grew up in a large extended family, including 22 first cousins, two uncles, and an aunt on her mother's Robrecht side, and an aunt and seven first cousins on her father's Mönighoff side. Minnie's aunts and uncles, like her parents, were born in Germany as were many of her cousins.

Minnie and Elisabeth were the only Mönighoff children who had children.

Elisabeth married Henry Spicker in November 1868 and they had seven children:

Henry Spicker remarried in 1883 a year after Elisabeth's death, had two more children, and died in 1886.

Marriage

Minnie was 17 years old when she and Rudolph Schwartz married. The mayor of Newark wed the young couple in a civil ceremony on 29 October 1884. Minnie was Catholic and Rudolph was Protestant, an awkward situation in those days. Their marriage certificate indicates that Minnie was 19 years old, however, she was a few months shy of her 18th birthday. Minnie's brother, Charles, was a witness to their marriage as was Rudolph's father, William.

Rudolph Schwartz, a 21-year-old plumber, was the son of German immigrant parents. His father was born in Rostock, a seaport near the Baltic coast. His mother was born in Baden, on the southwest edge of Germany. Rudolph, an only child, was born 17 September 1863. The newly weds made their home on Wallace Place in the Germantown community of Newark, NJ, where they were both born and raised.

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CHILDREN

On 16 May 1885 Minnie and Rudolph welcomed their first child into the world. He was named William, honoring his two grandfathers. William was baptized on 15 February 1886 at St. Augustine's German

Catholic Church.

Minnie's brother
Charles also died that

year in July at age 23, and the following year Minnie's 39 year-old brother, Joseph, died.

18 months after William's death, Minnie and Rudolph's first daughter, Minnie, was born on 10 May 1888. Later that year Rudolph's

father died and joined baby William in the Schwartz family plot at Woodland Cemetery in Newark, NJ.

Lillian, the second Schwartz daughter, was born on 5 April 1890, followed by Rudolph born 18 months later. Baby Rudolph lived only eight months and was buried 18 July 1892 in the Schwartz family plot. (No photo is available of baby Rudolph.)

The Schwartz Family History

Five months earlier, Minnie Mönighoff's father also died. He was living with Minnie, Rudolph, and their daughters on Norfolk Street in Newark at the time of his death on 2 March 1892. William Mönighoff was buried next to Minnie's mother at St. Mary's Catholic Cemetery in Newark, NJ.

The following year, Minnie's stepmother died. She also lived in the Schwartz family home at the time of her death. She willed her worldly goods to her daughter and nephew.

Gertrude Violet, Schwartz daughter number three, came into the world on 15 October 1896.

The Schwartz Family History

In 1904 Minnie and Rudolph celebrated their 20th wedding anniversary, and that year the Schwartz family portrait (left) was photographed.

For 60 years the familiar Germantown community of Newark, NJ was home to three generations Mönighoff and Schwartz families.

Their way of life was about to change.

THE MOVE TO CALIFORNIA

The Schwartz family moved from New Jersey to California in 1906, shortly after the February death of Anna Schwartz, Rudolph's mother.

The family briefly lived in Los Angeles, later relocating to San Francisco shortly after the devastating April 1906 earthquake. Much of San Francisco was destroyed by fire following the huge quake; consequently, work was plentiful for Rudolph who was as a plumbing contractor.

Minnie Mönighoff Schwartz lived to see most of her 13 grandchildren, and she and Rudolph lived in San Francisco for the remainder of their lives. Minnie was 61 years old when she died in 1928 after a long battle with high blood pressure, which was not treatable at that time.

A nurse, Emily, was hired to care for Minnie during the last years of her illness. Rudolph and Emily were later married.

Rudolph lived in the family home on Richland Street until his death in 1946 at age 82, and Emily died in 1958 at age 86.
